


Temple University and First-Generation College Student Enrollment


Temple University was founded as an institution to provide education to the underserved. As such, enrolling and serving first-generation college students is paramount to continuing in the original spirit of the university. There are many ways to define a first-generation college student. The tables below outline student enrollment based on the two most prevalent definitions of "first-generation." These data are taken from Temple University's New Student Questionnaire (NSQ), and feature only first-year students who remain enrolled in the University after the drop/add period of the fall semester.





In 2015, data about the college attainment on siblings of incoming students was collected through the NSQ to further enhance Temple's understanding of its first-generation population. It is important to note that these groups are not mutually exclusive. Students who fall into the neither parent/siblings attended college classification also fall into the neither parent/siblings graduated college classification³.
